

BIRDING PERU NORTH & SOUTH

Day 1: Arrive in Lima

Arrival to Lima International Airport and a partner of PTB will pick you up and transfer to our hotel selected for this tour. Overnight

Day 2: Lomas de Lachay, Paraiso Lagoon, flight to Chiclayo

Morning drive for 1 hour and 40 minutes to the north of Lima to reach Lomas de Lachay Reserve (105 km) a Coastal hill forest in the middle of the coastal desert where we can find: Coastal Miner, Thick-billed Miner, Cactus Canastero, Raimondi's Yellow-Finch, Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle, Variable Hawk, American Kestrel, Vermilion Flycatcher, Collared Warbling-finch, House Wren, Oasis Hummingbirds, Amazilia Hummingbirds, Andean Tinamou, Least Seedsnipe, Peruvian Meadowlark, Band-tailed Sierra-Finch and some others species according to the season. After some hours of birding, we will drive to our next birding place "Albufera Paraiso" for coastal species, a coastal wetland which is a

nice place for some migrants and resident species, such as Puna Plover, Peruvian Tern, Peruvian Pipit, Chilean Flamingo, Kelp, Belcher's, Gray, Gray-hooded Gulls, Inca Tern, Many-colored Rush-tyrant, Wren-like Rushbird, Yellow-hooded Blackbird, Great Grebe, White-checked Pintail, Yellow-crowned, Black-crowned Night-herons, and several other ones. After a great day, we will drive back to Lima airport for our afternoon flight to Chiclayo city.

Day 3: Peruvian Plantcutter - Bosque Pomac - Olmos

We will drive for 30 minutes to the south of Chiclayo to search the Endemic, endangered, and restricted specie: Peruvian Plantcutter (E), Rufous Flycatcher, Short-tailed Woodstar, Tumbes Hummingbird, Peruvian Sheartail, Amazilia Hummingbird, Oasis Hummingbird, Necklaced Spinetail, Superciliated Wren, Tumbesian Tyrannulet, Grey-and-White Tyrannulet, Plumbeous-backed Thrush, Scarlet-backed Woodpecker, Collared Antshrike, White-tailed Jay, Cinereous Finch, White-edged Oriole, Tumbes Tyrant (E) and many others. Then we will visit a small marsh Eten and part of the coastline. After nice morning birding, we will drive to Bosque Pomac Reserve for Peruvian Plantcutter, Rufous Flycatcher, Short-tailed Woodstar, Peruvian Sheartail, Amazilia Hummingbird, Oasis Hummingbird, Necklaced Spinetail, Superciliated Wren, Tumbesian Tyrannulet, Grey-and-White Tyrannulet, Plumbeous-backed Thrush, Scarlet-backed Woodpecker, Collared Antshrike, White-tailed Jay, Cinereous Finch, White-edged Oriole, Tumbes Tyrant. After both nice places, we will keep moving on our tour into a small town arriving in the afternoon. Night in Olmos

Day 4: Birding Quebrada Limon – Olmos

We will start our birding drive for 30 minutes to reach the entrance of Quebrada Limon. There we will make some stops along the dirt road for several species. We will need to get to the small town Quebrada Limon where we will start our search for White-winged Guan, Elegant Crescentchest, White-headed Brush-Finch, Ecuadorian Trogon, Ecuadorian Piculet, Pacific Elaenia, Guayaquil Woodpecker, Tumbes Tyrant, Tumbes Sparrow, Tumbes Hummingbird, Baird's Flycatcher, Parrot-billed Seedeater,



Chestnut-throated Seedeater, Pacific Parrotlet, Collared Warbling-Finch, Tumbes Tyrannulet and several other species found here. Then after a full day of birding along this valley, we will drive back to Olmos.

Day 5: Birding Limon de Porculla - Jaen

Breakfast. We will start our drive to Abra de Porculla for Piura Chat-Tyrant (E), Ecuadorian Piculet, Grey-browed Brush-finch, Bay-crowned Brush-finch, Henna-hooded Foliage-gleaner, Line-cheeked Spinetail, Gray, and Gold Tanager, Porculla Hermit, Black-cowled Saltator, Chapman's Antshrike, Chestnut-crowned Antpitta, Three-banded Warbler, Long-tailed Sylph, Green-tailed Trainbearer and several other species. After nice morning birding along this valley, we back to the main road and keep driving until Jaen Town with probably some stops along the road for some

Day 6: Birding Jaen – Bagua Chica - Pomacochas

Today we will search several areas along the road looking for the Northern-Slaty Antshrike, Red-crested Finch, Little Inca-Finch, Peruvian Pygmy-Owl, Striped Cuckoo, Tataupa Tinamou, Golden Grosbeak, Spot-throated Hummingbirds, Marañon Thrush, Marañon Crescentchest, Peruvian Pigeon and several other species along the trip. We usually arrive at Pomacochas town in the afternoon with the chance to stop at Huembo Center for some Hummingbirds, especially for Marvelous Spatuletail, bronzy Inca, Purple-throated Sunangel, Little Woodstar, White-bellied Hummingbird, Andean Emerald, Chestnut-breasted Coronet, Sparkling, Lesser Violetears and some tanagers species found at center surroundings. If time does not permit us to visit today, we will do the next day for sure which is only 15 from Pomacochas town.

Day 7: Birding San Lorenzo trail, Abra Patricia

Today we will explore the San Lorenzo trail for some endemic and restricted species found at this mountain ridge. This trail starts from 2,300 to 3,300 meters. The trail is not very easy but as soon as you find several of the species will be worth it. We can find along the trail: Russet-mantled Softtail, Northern Rufous-capped Antshrike, Peruvian Wren, Emerald Toucanet, Band-tailed Fruiteater, Barred Fruiteater, Black-throated Tody-tyrant, Spectacled Redstart, Chestnut-breasted Chlorophonia, Blue-and-black Tanager, Blue-winged, Grass-green, Lacrimose Mountain-tanagers, Cinnamon Flycatcher, Mountain Velvetbreast, Variable Antshrike, Red-crested Cotinga, Trilling Tapaculo, Blackish Tapaculo, Plain-tailed Wren, Oleaginous Hemispingus, Rufous Spinetail, Pale-Billed Antpitta, Gray-breasted Mountain-Toucan, Golden-plumed Parakeet. Then as soon we get to the main area as we usually arrive, we will start to walk down slowly searching for some missing species. After lunch, we will head to Abra Patricia

Day 8: Birding Abra Patricia, Afluente, Alto Nieva

Early birding drive along the popular Abra Patricia mountains searching for mixed flocks along the main road for Grass-green Tanager, Yellow-scarfed Tanager, Rufous-browed Peppershrike, Russet-crowned Warbler, Inca Flycatcher, Green and Black Fruiteater, Blue-winged Mountain-Tanager, Blue and Black Tanager, Spectacled Redstar and many more. Then at the lower part of the road will reach Afluente area (Llanteria) where we can find birds from mountain and cloudforest and humminbirds at the



feeder in Llanteria area with the chance to see walking along the main road Golden-naped Tanager, Huallaga Tanager, Yellow-breasted Antwren, Ash-throated Antwren, Russet Antshrike, Lined Antshrike, Rufous-rumped Foliage-gleaner, Spotted Barbtail, Ash-browed Spinetail, Ornate Flycatcher, Sepia-capped Flycatcher, Marble-faced Bristle-tyrant, Peruvian Tyrannulet, Olivaceous Greenlet, Blackish Antbird, Gilded Barbet, Ecuadorian Piedtail, Green Hermit, Grey-chinned Hermit, Fork-tailed Woodnymph, White-tipped Sicklebill, White-crowned Tapaculo, Lanceolated Monklet, Andean Cock-of-the-rock, Scaled Fruiteater and then we will turn back on our way to Abra Patricia with a stop at Fundo alto Nieva for the hummingbird feeder and searching for more species found along the valley such as Ochre-fronted Antpitta, Chestnut Antpitta, White-throated Screech-Owl, Rufous-banded Owl, Rufescent Screech-Owl, Rusty-tinged Antpitta, Rusty-breasted Antpitta, Black-throated Tody-Tyrant, Blue-and-black Tanager, White-faced Nunbird, Sword-billed Hummingbird, Emerald-bellied Puffleg, Long-tailed Sylph, White-bellied Woodstar, Bronzy Inca, Fawn-breasted Brilliant, Speckled Hummingbird, Lesser Violetear, Scarlet-bellied Mountain-Tanager, Grass-green Mountain-Tanager, Chestnut-bellied Mountain-Tanager, Hooded Mountain-Tanager, Barred Becard, Red-crested and Chestnut-crested Cotingas, Slaty-backed Chat-tyrant, Andean, white-eared Solitaries and many more and its time and climate permit we will search here for Cinnamon Screech-Owl and the restricted Long-whiskered owlet.



Day 9: Arena Blanca, Moyobamba (Waqanki Lodge)

Early birding along the road for some missing species and arrive at Aguas Verdes village where we will stay some hours birding at Arena Blanca feeders and surroundings for Little Tinamou, Cinereous Tinamou, Grey-necked Wood-rail, Ruddy Quail-dove, Orange-billed Sparrow, Rufous-breasted Wood-quail, Rufous-throated Sapphire, Black-throated Brilliant, Blue-fronted Lancebill, Green Hermit, Reddish Hermit, Black-throated Hermit, Napo Sabrewing, Gray-breasted Sabrewing, Rufous-crested coquette, Wire-crested Thorntail, Long-billed Starthroat, Many-spotted Hummingbird, Sapphire-spangled Emerald,

Golden-tailed Sapphire, Fork-tailed Woodnymph and some other hummingbird species according to the season. Then we will keep our trip to Moyobamba town where is located our next birding place. Waqanki property provides also great species of hummingbirds in the nice garden at the lodge surroundings and feeders where we can find Rufous-crested coquette, Black-throated Hermit, Brown Violetear, Grey-breasted Sabrewing, White-chinned Sapphire, White-necked Jacobin, Great-billed Hermit, Golden-tailed Sapphire, Fork-tailed Woodnymph and during the day mixed flocks of tanagers, flycatchers, trogons and Mishana Tyrannulet is found around. At the night there are some owls as Black-banded Owl, Tropical Screech-Owl.

Day 10: Birding Morro de Calzada, Misquiyacu trail & Drive to Tarapoto

In the morning we will visit the area preserve Morro de Calzada and some of the trails around the protected place for Swallow Tanager, Paradise, Turquoise, Black-bellied Tanagers, Blue-crowned, Amazonian White-tailed Trogons, Western Striolated Puffbird, Short-tailed Pygmy-Tyrant, Blue-ground Dove. On our back to Moyobamba we will stop at a small water pond for Masked Duck, Black-capped Donacobius, Rusty-backed Antwren, Wedge-tailed Grass-Finch, and then we will try to climb

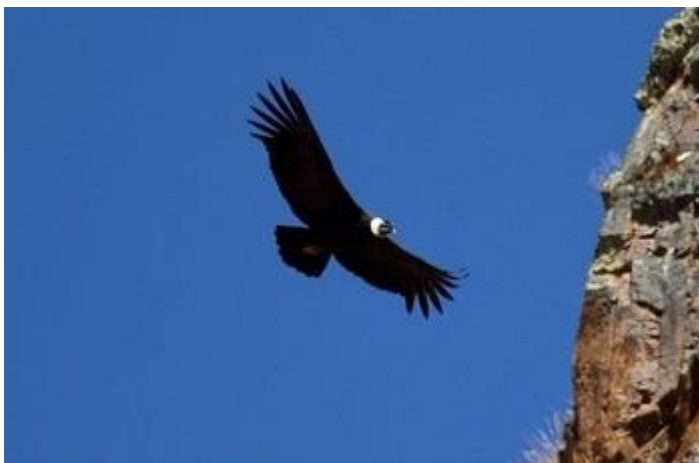


up walking Misquiyacu hill forest searching among this place for Lafresnaye's Piculet, Ornate Antwren, Black-and-white Tody-Flycatcher, Fiery-throated Fruiteater, Painted, Fiery-capped Manakins, Speckle-chested Piculet, Ash-throated Antwren and perhaps some mix flocks of species and after lunch, we will start our birding drive to Tarapoto town. There is a place known as Oilbird Bridge where we will stop for sure and with the chance to find around the forest

White-eyed parakeet, crested, russet-backed Oropendolas, Yellow-rumped Caciques, Gilded Barbet, and many more. Then we will keep birding along the road with another stop at the rice plantation searching for Spotted Rail, Oriole Blackbird, Comb Duck, Wattled Jacana, and many more

Day 11: Escalera Reserve, Aconabikh Station

Early morning drive up to the tunnel at Cordillera Escalera for Rose-fronted Parakeet, Blackish Pewee, Rough-legged Tyrannulet, Slaty-capped Shrike-vireo, además del Cliff Flycatcher, Flavescent Flycatcher, Streaked Flycatcher, Swallow Tanager, Yellow-crested Tanager, Magpie Tanager, Black-faced Dacnis, Yellow-headed Caracara, Green Honeycreeper, Olive Tanager, Rufous-bellied Euphonia, Pink-throated Brilliant, White-throated Woodpecker, Plumbeous Euphonia, Dotted Tanager, Curl-crested Aracari, Garlepp's Parakeet, Gilded Barbet, Chestnut-eared Aracari, Ivory-billed Aracari, Yellow-tufted Woodpecker, Purple-throated Euphonia, Blue-gray Tanager, Palm Tanager, Paradise Tanager, Silvery Tanager, Bay-headed Tanager, Swallow Tanager, Blue Dacnis, Purple Honeycreeper and many more. Then we will visit the next place Hermit Station trails and surroundings for Golden-headed Manakin, Thrush-like Antpitta, Peruvian Antwren, Black-faced Antthrush, Blue-crowned Manakin, Blue-backed Manakin, Fiery-capped manakin, Red-billed Toucanet, Hairy-crested Antbird, White-plumed Antbird, Black-faced Antbird, White-flanked Antwren, Pygmy Antwren, Golden-collared Woodpecker, Spix's Guan, Gold-collared Toucanet and at the feeder for hummingbirds Koepcke's Hermit, Gould's Jewelfront, Black-throated Mango, White-necked Jacobin and some other species according to the season. After a nice morning, we will drive back for lunch and then afternoon flight to Lima.



Day 12: Birding up to Santa Eulalia

Early drive from Lima for about 2 hours to get to the small town for some coffee and breakfast. Then we will start our birding drive for our first spot for Black-necked Woodpecker, Peruvian pygmy-owl, Oasis Hummingbird, and Peruvian Sheartail then we will continue to drive for around 1 hour for our next birding place for Bronzy-tailed Comet, Black Metaltail, Chestnut-bellied Brush-finch, Rusty-crowned Tit-Spintail and we will pass nearby a small Polylepis forest, small lagoons, bogs where we will be at 4,200 m high where we need to walk slowly and try to get some target species: White-bellied Cinclodes, Puna

Snipe, Andean Condor, Great Inca-Finch, Bare-faced Ground-Dove, Andean Swift, Peruvian Sheartail, Purple-collared Woodstar, Pied-crested Tit-Tyrant, Yellow-billed Tit-tyrant, White-browed Chat-Tyrant, White-capped Dipper, Chiguanco Thrush, Cinereous Conebill, Blue-capped Tanager, Mourning Sierra-Finch, Band-tailed Seed-eater, Golden-bellied Saltator, Striated Earthcreeper, White-winged Diuca-Finch, Peruvian Sierra Finch, Diademed Plover, White-bellied Cinclodes (E), Andean Goose, Puna Snipe, Giant Coot, Andean Hillstar, Mountain Caracara, Andean Flicker, Dorbigny's Chat-Tyrant and many more.

Day 13: Marcapomacochas, Ticlio & Lima

Early birding for some missing species and then we will drive to Lima arriving later in the afternoon.

Day 14: Villa Marshes (Pantanos de Villa) & Pucusana – Flight to Cusco

After breakfast, we will start our birding day. Villa Marshes is at 35 minutes from Lima-Miraflores. This nice natural reserve holds a great number of species residents and migrants such as Great Grebe, Pied-billed Grebe, Little Blue



Heron, White-cheeked Pintail, Plumbeous Rail, Wren-like Rushbird, Many-colored Rush-Tyrant, Yellowish(Peruvian) Pipit, Peruvian Meadowlark, Yellow-hooded Blackbird, Andean (slate-colored) Coot, Peruvian Thick Knee, Burrowing Owl, Yellow-crowned & Black-crowned Night-Herons, Black Skimmer, Puna Ibis, Cinnamon Teal, Franklins, belcher's, kelp, Gray-hooded, Gray Gulls and many others. Then we will need to drive for 40 minutes to get to Pucusana where we will have a short semi-pelagic trip on a local boat for one hour around searching for: Guanay and Red-legged Cormorants as well as Peruvian & Blue-footed Boobies, Inca Tern, Blackish Oystercatcher, Peruvian Pelican, Surf Cinclodes, Humboldt Penguin & many more. And if time permits, we can check Puerto Viejo & Some agriculture areas for Coastal Miner, Dark-face Ground-tyrant, Chestnut-throated Seedeater, Pied-crested Tit-tyrant, and many more.

Day 15: Mollepata & Birding to Soraypampa road

Morning drive to Limatambo town north of Cusco which is the entrance to Humantay Lagoon. This area provides great concentrations of endemic species and some Apurimac range distribution species. We usually find during this trip White-eared Puffbird, Apurimac Brush-Finch, Apurimac Spinetail, Vilcabamba Tapaculo, Apurimac Thistletail, Creamy-crested Spinetail, Chestnut-bellied Mountain-Finch, Rusty-fronted Canastero, White-tufted Sunbeam, Giant Conebill, Tufted Tit-Tyrant just to mentions some of the jewels of the area and in the night after dinner, we will look for Koepcke's Screech-owl and Buff-fronted Owl

Day 16: Birding to Abra Malaga, Carrizales & Ipal

Early drive to Ollantaytambo which is the main road up to one of the higher mountains Abra Malaga (4,330 mt) where we can find White-browed Tit-Spinetail, Puna Tapaculo, Streak-headed Antpitta, Ash-breasted Tit-Tyrant, Tawny Tit-Spinetail, Junin Canastero, Royal Cinclodes and many more. Then we will head to Carrizales at the eastern of the Pass searching for Marcapata Spinetail, Cusco Brush-Finch, Parodi's Hemispingus, Inca Wren, Green & White Hummingbird, Ocellated Piculet on our way to Ipal Ecolodge for Swallow-tailed Hummingbird, Masked Fruiteater and several others. Then we will head back to Ollantaytambo.



Day 17: Train Trip to Machu Picchu!

Today we will be transferred to the train station in Ollantaytambo to start our trip to Aguas Calientes the entrance of one of the wonders " Machu Picchu" Inca Ruin. The train trip is for about 1 hour and 30 minutes with the opportunity to see the nice scenery of the cloud forest and the Urubamba River from the train through the windows. After our nice trip by train, we will have a bus trip up the mountains to get to the Famous Inca Ruin. There we will finally arrive at the gate of Machu Picchu, there we can spend as much time you prefer to stay along the Inca Site,

but usually is around two hours or a bit more. Then we will back to the Aguas Calientes (Machu Picchu town) town for lunch and after if time permits, we can do some birding along the Urubamba River for: Torrent Duck, White-capped Dipper, and some other species along the cloud forest: Inca Wren, Ocellated Piculet, Green & white Hummingbird, Chestnut-capped Brush-finch, Sclater's Tyrannulet, Oleaginous Hemispingus and some other species usually seen there. Then we will take the train back to Cusco.

Day 18: Huacarpay Lake, Acjanaco Pass (3,100 mts) to Manu Road (1,400 mts)

Early start our day to Manu Road where we will enjoy a lot of different birds and amazing landscapes starting from Cusco at 3,399 (11,150 ft) and ending in the San Pedro area at 1,640 ft which will be our place to stay today. We will first stop at Huacarpay lake for a couple of hours searching for some species found there and then we will drive to Paucartambo village and Acjanaco pass where start Manu National Park. From there we will start our birding trip along Manu Road. We usually arrive at our first birding lodge at dusk.

Some species that we can see today: Andean Gull, Puna Ibis, Plumbeous Rail, Chiguanco Thrush, Andean Lapwing, Bearded Mountaineer (E), Band-tailed Seedeater, Hooded Siskin, Andean Flicker, Giant Hummingbird, Green-tailed, Black-tailed Trainbears, Rusty-fronted Canastero (E), Creamy-crested Spinetail (E), Chestnut-bellied Mountain-Finch (E), Black-throated, Masked, Moustached Flowerpiercers, Hooded Mountain-Tanager, Scarlet-bellied Mountain-Tanager, Golden-collared Tanager, Grass-green Tanager, Montane Woodcreeper, Streaked Tuftedcheek, Band-tailed Tyrannulet, Capped Conebill, Superciliaried Hemispingus and many more.



Day 19: Manu Road birding & Lodge surroundings

Today we will have a full day of birding along the lower side of the Manu Road descending up to 700 meters. For our coffee break will watch the hummingbird feeder & Tanager fruit platform at the lodge and part of the afternoon the upper road ending with an owl search before dinner.

Some species that we can see today: Andean Cock of the Rock, Versicolored Barbet, Beryl-spangled, Saffron-Crown, Golden Tanagers and Orange-eared, Yellow-throated,

Slaty, Golden-naped, Paradise, Blue-necked, Bay-headed, black-goggled Tanager, Yellow-bellied, Green & Gold, Spotted Tanagers, Deep-blue Flowerpiercer, Three-stripe Warbler, Russet-crowned Warbler, Black-faced Brush-finch, Golden-headed, Crested Quetzal, Amazonian Umbrellabird, Wire-crested Thorntail, Speckled Hummingbird, Violet-headed Hummingbird, Peruvian Piedtail (E), Many-spotted Humminbird, Botted Raquetail, Gray-mantled Wren, Blue-naped Chlorophonia, Mountain Foliage-Gleaner, Olive-Backed Woodcreeper, Stripe Threehunter, Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant, Marble-faced Bristle-Tyrant, Stripe-Chested Antwren, White-backed Fire-Eye, Black-eared Hemispingus, Yellow-breasted Antwren, Yungas Manakin, Yellow-throated, short-billed, common Chlorospingus, Dusky-Green, Russet-Backed, Crested Oropendolas, Rufous-tailed Tyrant, Chestnut-backed Antshrike, Unicolored Antshrike, Yellow-breasted Warbling Antbird, Rufescent Screech-Owl, Lyre-tailed Nightjar and many more.

Day 20: Birding Manu Road (Pilcopata area at 650 mts)

Early morning visit the popular and nice Cock of the rock lek, which is a place where every morning several males meet to display and try to attract a female. After this great experience, we will keep birding along the Manu Road searching for several other bird species found at lower elevations and forest types where we might start to found Red-billed Scythebill, Cinnamon-faced Tyrannulet, Violaceous, purple Jays, Chestnut-eared, Ivory-billed Aracaris, White-tufted, lineated, crimson-crested Woodpeckers and many more.



There are new birding spots close to the area: Mirador Pico de Oz & Inkamazonia both places have a hummingbird feeder. We will plan to visit both places for Rufous-crested Coquette, Golden-tailed Sapphire, Sapphire-spangled, Blue-tailed Emeralds, Fork-tailed Woodnymph, White-necked Jacobin, Gray-breasted Saphirewing, Brown Violetear, Great-billed, White-bearded, Rufous-breasted, Koepcke's Hermits and many more. And in the afternoon, we will do some of the trails of the lodge for a bamboo specialist such as Bamboo Antshrike, Striated, Manu, Goeldi's, White-lined, Antbirds, Rufous-headed Woodpecker, White-cheeked tody-flycatcher, Black-backed tody-flycatcher and many more. And we will try to find some owls at dusk!

DAY 21: Birding Upper Manu Road up to 3,000 mts

Today we will have a morning birding for some missing species along the bamboo trail before we leave and start our birding drive up to 3,000 meters where is located our last lodge in Manu Road. This area will provide us to watch: Scarlet-bellied Mountain-Tanager, Grass-green Mountain-Tanager, Chestnut-bellied Mountain-Tanager, Hooded

Mountain-Tanager, Barred Becard, Red-crested and Chestnut-crested Cotingas, Slaty-backed Chat-tyrant, Golden-collared Tanager, Gray-breasted Mountain-Toucan, Blue-banded Toucanet, Red and White Antpitta (E), Marcapata Spinetail (E) Andean, white-cheeked Solitaires and many more.



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Day 22: Birding & Transfer to Cusco airport, Puerto Maldonado, Lake Sandoval

Early birding along the road for some missing species and after lunch we will head back to Cusco airport and flight to Puerto Maldonado and birding to Lake Sandoval.

Day 23: Oxbow Lake birding, Giant River Otters, Monkeys

Early birding by boat along the lake for several species such as Ringed, Green, Amazon, Green and Rufous, Pygmy Kingfishers, Agami, Capped, Cocoi Herons, Green ibis, Sungrebe, Silvered, Banded Antbirds, Streak Antwren, Long-billed Woodcreeper, Point-tailed Palmcreeper, Hoatzin, Black-cowled Wood-Rail, Paradise, White-winged, White-banded Swallows and many more. And with good luck a family of Giant River Otters & Black Caiman, Red-howler Monkey. After a great first hour of the morning, we will back for breakfast and then some birding along the trails with the chance to find: Cream-colored, Lineated, Ringed Woodpeckers, Crimson-crested, Red-necked Woodpeckers, Great jacamars, Black-tailed, Blue-crowned, Collared, Amazonian Trogons, Amazonian, Rufous, Broad-billed Motmots, Pale-winged Trumpeter, Curl-crested, Ivory-billed, Letter, Chestnut-eared Aracaris, Buff-throated, Cinnamon-throated, Elegant, Inanbari, Wedge-billed, Plain-brown, Long-tailed Woodcreepers, Black-faced, White-browed, Chestnut-tailed, Gray, White-throated Antbirds, Purple-throated Fruitcrow, Bare-necked Fruitcrow, Golden-Collared Toucanet, Emerald Toucanet, Curl-crested Aracari, Chestnut-eared Aracari, Ivory-billed Aracari and many more.

Day 24: Oxbow Morning birding & afternoon transfer to Puerto Maldonado

Morning birding along the trails and after we will start our trip back to Puerto Maldonado. After nice lunch in our favorite restaurant will do some birding for the Purus, White-throated, Bluish-fronted Jacamars, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Hooded Tanager, Red-bellied, Blue-headed Macaws, Rusty-backed Antbird, white-faced whistling-duck, Brazilian Teal, Southern, Pied Lapwings, Collared Plover and many

Day 25: Biggest Macaw Clay Lick & Flight to Lima

Early drive and boat ride to the upper Tambopata River with the chance to find Orinoco Goose, Razor-Billed Curassow, and with good luck Jaguar, Tapir, or even Puma. Chunchu Macaw Clay Lick is considered the biggest and diversity in the world. Where every morning macaws, parrots, and parakeets meet here to socialize and get some minerals from the river bank (cliff) as important for their diet. We can see here: Red & Green, Blue & Yellow, Scarlet, Chestnut-fronted, Macaws, Mealy, Yellow-crowned, Blue-headed Parrots, Dusky-headed, White-eye Parakeets with the chance to see toucans, monkeys and several other species of birds at the canopy of the forest.

After the amazing morning, we turn back the same way to Puerto Maldonado for the afternoon flight to Lima and connections.
